Interfaith Council of Greater Richmond



Interfaith Community of Greater Richmond presented the 51st Brotherhood/Sisterhood Youth Awards at Trinity on Thursday, February 15. Juniors and Seniors from 44 area High Schools arrived at 2 pm for special activities, games, and a wonderful meal. Meeting them in the parking lot was part of the joy of our hospitality. Each student received this special award for epitomizing the ideal of human connection across all potential obstacles.

The Brotherhood/Sisterhood Award was originally envisioned by Monsignor Hugh McMenemy of Denver in 1934 as a special time set aside when people of all faiths would get together, to discuss their differences and commonalities and affirm the human bonds that underlie the variations in their different backgrounds. Here in Richmond, the practice of working with the National Brotherhood/Sisterhood Youth Awards began in 1968. These students have the ability to relate to others with empathy and understanding regardless of gender, race, religious, and other perceived differences. They participate in activities that improve human relations, that promote inter-group understanding, and that create harmony between people. They identify and actively respond to those in need with compassion and service. They reach out to help others within their school, the local community and even the world, at large.

Carol Wampler is Trinity's representative to ICGR and helped plan this event with assistance from a variety of UMW volunteers who offered hospitality as greeters. Bill Pike was key in planning the logistics for use of the Mastin Room, Welcome Center, and Sanctuary for the Service. Rev. Drew Willson offered the opening prayer of welcome. Kisha Anderson prepared the meal for our students and the Welcome Center reception for parents and students. Each student received a special treat bag prepared during Service Day with the John Wesley quotation: *"Do all the good you can, to all the people you can, whenever you can,..."* Trinity last hosted this event fifteen years ago.

The Sacred Places of My Heart Recap

Ann Marie Blackmon shared *The Sacred Places of My Heart* in her presentation to us Tuesday, February 13 entitled *Finding God Where the Wild Things Are*. Inspired by a [Faith Sharing](#) during Sunday worship on Volunteer Emergency Families for Children, she and Shaw undertook to host children in their home for short term emergency care. Although Ann Marie initially imagined it to be as simple as adding an extra plate to the dinner table, she quickly learned that the trauma experienced by their guest children made the work both challenging and deeply rewarding. Describing herself as an average kind of woman, we felt just the opposite about her as we heard about their long term work changing lives through VEFC and the demanding work of leading the Trinity Youth Ministry and teaching Middle School Sunday School. Ann Marie told about her love for camping and being a camp counselor. Getting children outdoors often works wonders. She also told about encouraging the eighth graders to help the sixth graders as they can subtly encourage and discourage certain behaviors. Ann Marie shared her favorite and very simple prayer: *God, help me!* A more genuine and heart-felt Valentine Sermon could not be even imagined than what we were so fortunate as to hear. How blessed Trinity is to have members like Ann Marie and Shaw, who by the way was also leading Upward Basketball during much of this time.

United Methodist Family Services

The UMFS Auxiliary celebrated January, February, and March birthdays with a delicious lunch, ice cream & cake, and bingo. Each of our students left with a special birthday bag. Our residential students are attending worship at Reveille, a church which also hosts a monthly dinner for them, as well as a Prom in May. The Richmond Painters Association has again chosen UMFS as a beneficiary and is currently painting and renovating the much-used Foster Care Building. The newly furnished recreation Den is located in the basement of the dining hall and has become a favorite resource for the students. The twenty-five mentors who volunteer with the children also like to use the Den and a newly created mentor closet filled with art supplies, board games, etc. when they are working with students. The Auxiliary will honor the 180 staff members with special St. Patrick's Day treat bags to be assembled at the March meeting.
