

Continuing the Legacy of the United Methodist Women

All of my previous articles have highlighted our history. This month you are celebrating the 150th Anniversary of the United Methodist Women, so this month I want to focus on you. We each need to take a moment to reflect on where we are as an organization in the present. Speaking as an art historian, you can only truly appreciate contemporary art if you know what came before it. (Otherwise, you are looking at a red color field and thinking...hmm, everyone can be an artist...but I digress.) Therefore, I think we now have the tools to truly appreciate today, our anniversary.

When I looked back to the previous articles, I realized there were many shared themes. The daily life and the struggles of Methodist women changed as we moved through time. However, their goals for their organizations remained basically the same. All of these women shared God's love through their gifts and their actions. They followed the teachings of Jesus Christ even when it did not align with contemporary politics and societal pressures. These women were forward-thinking and envisioned a better world for women. They took action when called upon to realize this vision, and they were often outspoken in reaffirming their beliefs.

Now thinking about today, you are a part of this tradition. I think this is best highlighted in the UMW Mission Priorities and the Action Alerts. All of you are probably familiar with these. I stumbled upon this information on the UMW website while conducting my research. I felt the current mission priorities deserved to be reemphasized. The UMW is advocating for Climate Justice, Maternal & Child Health, Criminalization of Communities of Color & Mass Incarceration, and Economic Inequality. Some of the most recent Action Alerts included *The Poor People's Campaign, Your Vote. Our Voices. Speak Up for Our Future, Get Out and Vote!, Air Pollution and Public Health, and Maternal Healthcare is a Human Right*. We should be proud of the scope of this work, because it encompasses so many facets of daily life and well-being. The UMW continues to protect women, children, and the oppressed from social injustice. All of these mission priorities and action alerts are extremely current and political. This is why it is so powerful that Christian women have taken

responsibility for the actual work of uplifting those affected by sharing their gifts, time, and teaching about the power of God's love.

Just by being a part of the United Methodist Women, you are a part of all of these conversations. Your gifts and your actions will help affect change in the world. We saw in our histories the impact that Methodist women had on communities. There is every reason to believe that our actions today will make the same impact. The legacy of our many historical figures lives on as we continue their work. Congratulations on 150 years of mission and fellowship; may the next 150 years be just as successful.

It has been a pleasure researching the United Methodist Women. The history of this organization and the women who made it possible deserve the recognition. Hopefully they will be featured more prominently in the history texts in the future. Thank you for the opportunity!
