Pastor's Corner

⁵ John baptized with water, but in only a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit." ⁶ As a result, those who had gathered together asked Jesus, "Lord, are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel now?"

⁷ Jesus replied, "It isn't for you to know the times or seasons that the Father has set by his own authority. ⁸ Rather, you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." Acts 1:5-8

In the midst of Jesus talking with the disciples, just before his ascension, he told them that it's not for us to know the times or seasons God works in. That's a helpful reminder for us, especially as we move into a busy fall. We like answers, resolutions, and results. But sometimes, we don't get them in the time we want them. Sometimes, God works on a completely different schedule than ours.

I believe God's plans and timing are always better than ours. Sometimes, we faithfully follow, sometimes we try to lead too much, or refuse to follow at all. This behavior is part of our human nature. What I believe is that when we are faithful to the best of our ability, we live our best and happiest lives. Our best selves reflect the grace of God into the world, whether in our homes, our communities, or the wider world.

With that framework set, let us apply that to our life together at Trinity. We are in a new season. Things of past seasons may or may not translate to this one. There are things about this season that we have yet to discover. Let us focus on God's timing, on God's season, on God's way. Let us focus less on our own desires if they are at all cross purposes with God's. I believe God wants to change hearts and lives, beginning with each one of us. Everything else is secondary.

Let's focus together in this new season on God's timing. Let us strive to follow faithfully in this new season that looks similar to seasons past, but is in many ways quite different. We are together as God's people in this place and time. It's a great time to be at Trinity. I'm looking forward to the ride together.

together, while adults engage in meaningful discussion around "the Table."



Farewell from Charles

I still remember Thursday, December 6, 1990 when Bill McClure picked me up at the Richmond airport. Before that day, I had never heard of VMI or Ukrops! The great hymn-writer, Isaac Watts, wrote "Time, like an everrolling stream, Bears all its sons away; They fly forgotten, as a dream Dies at the opening day." What an everrolling stream these last 32 years have been! I had planned to stay at Trinity for maybe 3 years. And here we are today. Trinity's strength has always been its people and, at least with me, its flexibility. I was always allowed and even encouraged to pursue my own professional life as a pianist which means lots of time for practice and rehearsal. I soloed with the Richmond Philharmonic more than any pianist in its history, and this is just one example of why I'm finishing my career in Richmond. It's been my greatest privilege to serve this small branch of Christendom by leading (at one time or another) its children, youth, adults, bells and instruments. I've been able to provide music for young couples as they begin their married life and to offer a little comfort for families as they say their last goodbyes. And we've done it all with a little laughter - the first of my somewhat unorthodox funeral recessionals came when Gene Woodridge asked if I would play "Take Me Out to the Ballgame" for Ted Hutton's service, or perhaps when Ken Gassman (at the wedding rehearsal) requested that the "Mickey Mouse Theme" be worked into the "Ode to Joy" (works really well in the pedals!). Oh, the stories I have! But now it's time for someone new to take the reins. That person will bring his or her own gifts and strengths and even a few weaknesses. Godknows I had my share (of weaknesses, that is.) But the folks of Trinity will embrace and support that person as you did me and Trinity's ministry to the community will extend to a new generation. "Oh God, our help in ages past, Our hope for years to come, Be thou our guide while life shall last, And our eternal home."



Interested in becoming an Acolyte?

The Trinity Acolyte program currently involves 30+ young people in grades 6-12 who are selected because of their interest and commitment to the worship experience. Acolytes are helpers and assist in many aspects of the worship service.

First year acolytes are considered acolytes-in-training for one year. Selected senior high acolytes (grades 10-12) are given additional training in order to assist in special activities. Each Sunday, one of these acolytes is designated as such and will supervise the other acolytes as well as receive the offering. Participation for all students usually involves serving as the Crucifer (will carry the cross), being a candle lighter (responsible for lighting and extinguishing altar candles, helping with the offering), or being a Bible bearer (places the Bible on the altar).

The Trinity Acolyte Program is an excellent example of the commitment of Trinity young people in service to their church and their faith.

FAQs:

Who can participate? Youth in grades 6-12

Do acolytes need to be confirmed in the Methodist church?

No; confirmation is <u>not</u> a requirement to participate!

How often do acolytes serve?

Availability is requested on a monthly basis, so you can participate when your schedule permits! Most serve about once a month. Special church events such as Christmas and Easter may involve more frequent participation.

Is training provided?

Yes! Acolytes will receive instruction and will begin with experienced acolytes who can assist and answer questions.

All the features are utilized in our Saturday Outdoor Club attended by 60 children and volunteers each Saturday.

We will be planting trees, planting woodland plants and installing a walking trail. This is a wonderful opportunity for Trinity families "to make God's love real" for the children and families of Bellemeade.
