Pastor's Corner

3 Look, I am sending my messenger who will clear the path before me; suddenly the Lord whom you are seeking will come to his temple.

It's July, a special month for us in the United States. It's the month that we celebrate the beginning of our country, our independence from an overseeing, occupying power. In "America the Beautiful," that beautiful hymn written by Katherine Lee Bates, the text celebrates much of what makes America beautiful and special to many of us. But tucked into the end of the second verse are these words, "America! America! May God thy gold refine, till all success be nobleness, and every gain divine." And then in the third verse, "America! America! God mend thine every flaw, confirm thy soul in self-control, thy liberty in law." Ms. Bates knew that any country worth celebrating also must have the humbleness to recognize its own faults and ask God, the Divine Ruler of the Universe, for help in becoming better. Moving toward God's direction is better.

I fear that our country has lost some of that challenge and embraced the spirit of shedding the controlling power to an extreme. We have stopped asking for divine guidance. Our quest for independence has become absolute, even to the point that laws are subject to personal analysis if they apply to oneself. As a society, we have come to believe that the individual self is most important, sometimes to the detriment of the greater good. Individual effort is applauded over communal greatness. Our churches have fallen prey to this, too. The beauty of a large successful church such as Trinity is the amount of impact that we can have in the lives of those who come and the wider world. The danger of a large, successful church such as Trinity is that it becomes very easy to think we did something on our own. We did and do great things, but the best we do is when we can pause, reflect, ask God for guidance, and shift in the direction God leads. This is God's work, and we get to be part of it. It is, and never has been, about us. This is a difficult mindset to manifest and manage in our hyper-individualized self-dependent culture. It takes all of us holding each one accountable; it takes much prayer.

My prayer for our country, and Trinity United Methodist Church, is that "God mend thine every flaw," that we may be refined and cleansed as the prophet Malachi said, and that we are willing and able to let God do it. No person, no organization, no country, is perfect. Let our humility to God be greater than our hubris of a self-help, individualized culture. We are, indeed, better together, and even better when we let God lead – especially if that's in some new previously unimagined direction. Are we listening?



Delegate Update from Annual Conference!

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I had the honor and privilege of attending the Virginia Annual Conference in Roanoke this past week as a delegate from Trinity. This was my first year attending and I was moved, challenged, energized, and inspired in ways I could never have imagined. I met many incredible people and was touched to see so many familiar faces from Trinity, past, present and future, serving the Conference dutifully: Pastor Brian was in charge of all technology at the conference, Pastor Judy prayed over retiring clergy, Pastor Drew Willson led music, Pastor Hung Su made a moving motion to make families more welcome at Conference, and we had the great honor of seeing Aaron Miller licensed as a Local Pastor and Pastor Daniel Certified as a Provisional Elder.

The Conference was a wonderful mixture of business, fellowship, and worship. One of the largest pieces of business was the presentation and endorsement of the Christmas Covenant. This is a proposal for regionalization and contextualization, allowing the General Conference to focus on Global issues and allowing the US to focus on issues closer to home. This piece of legislation will be presented at General Conference in 2024 with the Virginia Conference's endorsement. The budget presentation included increases to the information technology budget, keeping our personal information safer and providing better services for our districts, made possible by a large decrease in our legal funds as disaffiliations and open cases come to a close. You can view the budget report here. I was also energized by the presentation of several Service opportunities that are supported by the Conference and Methodist Ministries. One local to us is Heart Havens which serves adults with developmental disabilities.

This was the first Conference with Bishop Sue Haupert-Johnson. Her first sermon was incredibly open, honest, and straight-forward. She addressed the issues plaguing our denomination and world and pointed out that our current reactions are to "build walls and circle the wagons" but that when we do that, the wagons have nowhere to go. She encouraged us to pursue our ministry and service beyond our four walls. That really stuck with me during the entirety of the conference and was compounded when Reverend Seungsoo Jun said, "If your church suddenly closed tomorrow, how would your community react? Would they rejoice? Mourn? Or would they even notice?" I have been thinking about this constantly and I hope you will consider the answer to this question as well.

Art Utley attended as a delegate from our Three Notch'd District. He says, "It was the best conference I've been to in seven years. There was less tension, more harmony, more humor, and more unity. The Christmas Covenant Resolution gave us a voice in the General Conference and is a bright path to our future for the United Methodist Church."

I look forward to continuing to serve Trinity as a delegate and look beyond our four walls for ways to serve Jesus, our community, and our conference. As your delegate, I promise to be a good connection between the Conference and our Church and continue to provide information and opportunities. Let's focus on the things that matter most to God and as Bishop Sue said in her closing, let us "not love the building more than Jesus and do not love the past more than the future."

New Shoes for Back to School

New Shoes for Back to School is a ministry carried out by a group called the Metropolitan Partnership of Churches/Synagogue. This year, the coalition is made of 10 churches (including Trinity) plus one synagogue. The group provides new shoes to K-12 schoolchildren in underserved communities in the metro Richmond area. This is the sixth year that Trinity has been a part of this ministry.

The New Shoes Ministry is continuing with its "Plan B" that has been so successful during the COVID-19 pandemic. Instead of one distribution day open to the public, the organizers have reached out directly to area Title 1 schools. Each church/synagogue will again provide shoes directly to their assigned schools during the first half of September. There are three ways you can help:

- 1. **Stay tuned for more details**, including sizes and numbers of shoes needed. You can purchase and drop them by the Welcome Center or you can order shoes online from your favorite store and have them delivered to Trinity.
- 2. **Consider making a financial gift.** This allows organizers to be efficient in purchasing shoes (often they are needed for older students). Please specify "New Shoes Ministry" with your donation.
- 3. **Keep the New Shoes for Back to School Ministry in your prayers.** The lead organizer is Third Street Bethel A.M.E., a church founded circa 1850 that shares a history with Trinity UMC. This is a great way to recognize and continue that important relationship.

Mattaponi Healing Eagle Clinic

It is that time of year for our annual campaign to help support the Mattaponi Eagle Healing Clinic. Last year the congregation of Trinity Methodist Church contributed over \$3,000 to help purchase supplies that included both needed medical items, vaccinations, and personal hygiene items for the Mattaponi Eagle Healing Clinic.

These contributions helped sustain services to over 125 families of native Americas mostly from the Mattaponi and Upper Mattaponi tribes, but also including assistance for request from the Rappahannock, Pamunkey, and Chickahominy tribes in Eastern and Central Virginia. Diane Garrison who is the coordinator of Indian affairs was extremely thankful for our support particularly during these difficult times.

This year, Diane is again asking for monetary donations to help the staff and the volunteers needed to handle the logistics of storage and distribution of medical and other supplies. The Eagle Clinic has made an arrangement with a local Mechanicsville drug store program that provides medical supplies, including prescriptions, baby formula, and children's diapers on a more targeted and effective manner.

The Healing Eagle Clinic still has doctors and nurses administer patient care on an as needed basis. Your contributions will help support these efforts by providing the necessary medical supplies.

What is the Apple Angel Tree?

Trinity has partnered with Oak Grove-Bellemeade Elementary School through the city-wide Micah Initiative for over 15 years. One of our most popular projects each year has been to provide much-needed school supplies. Over 50 Trinity families participate in this effort each year. During the Spring, we meet with the lead teachers for all grade levels at the school and come up with a list of items the teachers would like to receive for their classrooms. There are about 150 apples that can be "picked from our tree" for the upcoming school year.

A Century of Leading Christian Service Throughout India!

For many years, part of Trinity's Lenten Mission Offering has supported scholarship aid at Leonard Theological College (LTC), in central India. That graduatelevel seminary has now completed its one-hundredth year of producing leaders for India's Methodist churches.

To honor LTC, Roland Fernandez -- the General Secretary of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church, who works in Atlanta, Georgia -- issued the following message on March 11:

We "give thanks for a century of faithful service to God and the human family by the Leonard Theological College of Jabalpur, India Since its founding ... the college has prepared more than 6000 leaders for the Christian community in India and beyond ... spiritual and professional training for a substantial percentage of the pastors and deaconesses of the Methodist Church in India ... I remember fondly the many visits I made to the Leonard Theological College during my years as Chief Auditor of the Methodist Church in India in the late 80s and early 90s."

Major Article in "Christianity Today" Highlights Work Supported by Trinity

Background for Trinity Window readers: For many years, part of Trinity's Lenten Mission Offering has supported scholarship aid at the Baltic Methodist Theological Seminary, in Estonia. Estonia finally received its independence from Russia in 1994 and the Seminary was founded a few years later. It's now the largest Methodist seminary in Europe. The seminary's President is Dr. Kulli Toniste. Its graduates serve as pastors and youth ministers in many of its nearby countries, taking the central message of Jesus with them. (Also, according to Wikipedia, the magazine Christianity Today was founded by Billy Graham in 1956, the Washington Post calls Christianity Today "evangelicalism's flagship magazine", and the New York Times describes it as a "mainstream evangelical magazine".)

The article's headline is "Estonia Seminary Unites War-Weary Russians and Ukrainians in Christ. Baltic Methodist Seminary offers a rare safe space to Slavic foes."

The article -- nearly two thousand words long -- is in the May/June issue of Christianity Today. Its final sentence is: "The informal education students receive from each other is just as valuable as our curriculum of theology," Toniste said. "Estonians know about life under occupation, and how much better it is to be free."
