Day 1: Sunday, October 29

James 1:17

Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows.

This verse is part of a larger passage in the Book of James that discusses the trials, temptations, and importance of faith as we all walk in this journey of life on earth. The verse emphasizes that all good things in our lives, whether they be talents, blessings, or other forms of goodness, come from God. And, unlike the natural world, where shadows change with the movement of the sun or light sources, God is unchanging and constant. This attribute of God is often referred to as His Immutability and signifies that His character, love, and promises remain steadfast and reliable. Trinity United Methodist Church has reflected God's promise to the Peele family since we joined the church in 1985.

The Trinity Christian family has been the foundation of our faith for almost 40 years. Both of our children were baptized at this special place and later worshipped here. Sandy walked our daughter Ashley down the aisle of Trinity when she was married. In this sanctuary we witnessed four grandchildren become baptized in the name of Christ. It lifts our hearts to witness Ashley continue to worship and serve God here in such roles as Trinity Kids Camp Leader, member of the Church Council, Children's Council and Church Conference Representative.

Day 2: Monday, October 30

Matthew 6:19-21

Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moths and vermin destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. Day 3: Tuesday, October 31

Proverbs 10:22

The blessing of the Lord brings wealth, without painful toil for it.

In Proverbs 10, King Solomon provides a series of antithetical comparisons, focusing on the contrast between the righteous vs. the wicked – specifically how the righteous are wise, are hard workers and show love, whereas the wicked are lazy and foolish and practice hate.

Today's verse – “The Lord’s blessing makes a person rich, and no trouble is added to it” (Common English Bible) – does not offer a direct contrast like many other verses in Proverbs 10, but in the context of this chapter, Solomon invites us to consider this: the righteous and the wicked can both attain riches, but from where does that wealth come, how is that wealth used and can one be burdened by it? For those seeking righteousness, Solomon knows that that our wealth and riches come from God. When we rejoice that God’s blessings make us wealthy, we receive the additional comfort that “no trouble is added it” – God’s riches don’t come with strings attached.

At Trinity, we, as a family and as a congregation, are also wealthy – God’s blessings abound. Given we are a family with younger children, our Trinity experience at the moment revolves around the Kid’s Ministry. For our family, we might as well apply the Capital Campaign’s tagline of “Building Generations Together” as the tagline for Trinity’s Kid’s Ministry. Our 3 children are so lucky to have a team – of all ages and generations – that makes learning about the stories of Jesus, Moses, Daniel and more so exciting and fun on a weekly basis (well, and earning the opportunity to dig into Ms. Jen’s candy stash helps too!). Alas, this is a devotion centered around a capital campaign, so for us, we are inspired by so many at Trinity because we both want a church home that can consistently help increase the riches of our children’s spiritual piggy bank. So, as you and your family consider being a part of the Building Generations Together campaign, perhaps you will be inspired by today’s verse and the reminder that “every good and perfect gift is from above” (first half of James 1:17).

Day 4: Wednesday, November 1

Philippians 4:4

Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Some of you have heard this, but I have a friend that always reminded me, “You are as young as you’ll ever be!”. Then I think, “Yes, June, that’s right!” So, I will keep decorating the kid’s rooms, hoping to bring the Bible alive. I feel at “peace” when I am in Trinity. Day 5: Thursday, November 2

Genesis 12:1-2

Day 6: Friday, November 3

Luke 21:1-4

As Jesus looked up, he saw the rich putting their gifts into the temple treasury. He also saw a poor widow put in two very small copper coins. This Capital Campaign is an opportunity to delight God. An opportunity to give Him our gifts. Instead of us comparing ourselves to the poor widow (or pew neighbor) and wondering if we're doing enough, my hope is that we remember that God welcomes the gifts of everyone. May you find joy in delighting God through your gifts.

Day 7: Saturday, November 4

Acts 4:33-37

With great power the apostles continued to testify to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus. And God's grace was so powerfully at work in them all that there were no needy persons among them. For from time to time those who owned land or houses sold them, brought the money from the sales and put it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to anyone who had need. Joseph, a Levite from Cyprus, whom the apostles called Barnabas (which means "son of encouragement"), sold a field he owned and brought the money and put it at the apostles' feet.

Deuteronomy 8:18

Day 10: Tuesday, November 7

Proverbs 16:3

Commit to the Lord whatever you do, and he will establish your plans.

At first glance, this passage may seem relatively light-hearted. “Commit to the Lord whatever you do” – does this mean literally everything, even picking up sticks or trash? Other translations use “works” instead of “do”, which implies more of a sense of calling. The fact is, the Christian journey (or calling) is never a straight path, but often a journey with many twists and turns, moments when you feel that you left the path long ago or forgot what the path even looks like. But God still has a calling for each of us, and this calling is often in stages at a time.

In my own journey, I can clearly see times that God called me from one chapter to the next—giving me just enough of a plan to move forward. Command them to do good, to be rich in good deeds, and to be generous and willing to share. In this way they will lay up treasure for themselves as a firm foundation for the coming age, so that they may take hold of the life that is truly life.

I feel very blessed to lead Trinity's Kids Ministry and do ministry alongside wonderful families and volunteers! There are many stories I could share about how Trinity's need is fulfilled by someone's special gifting; this is just one of those stories:

Kids Camp 2022 was our first Kids Camp after COVID. We had lots of kids signing up but didn't have the number of volunteers that we needed to accommodate all of our campers. I reached out to all of my personal contacts at Trinity, but we still needed more volunteers. As a last resort, I began searching for contacts in our church database that I could reach out to and see if they could participate. I began with "A" and worked my way down through a list I had put together. One of the women I texted reached back and told me that although she had never helped with a VBS before, she was in! My newest Kids Camp recruit was Bonnie Andrews! Bonnie was so creative the entire week of Kids Camp and did fun things with her crew! At the end of the week, she put together the display case that served as a great recap of what occurred over the week!

After she recovered from all of the fun of Kids Camp, I asked her to consider being my decorator for our kids' space. She said, "Yes!" Every month Bonnie uses her creativity and artistic ability to transform our Kids Space to a desert, city, farm, amusement park, lion's den, etc. with stunning results that are enjoyed by everyone who enters the room!

I smile every time I see Bonnie's decorations! They serve as an example of what beauty takes place when someone willingly and unselfishly uses their gifts for God's Kingdom!

Deuteronomy 15:10

Give generously to them and do so without a grudging heart; then because of this the Lord your God will bless you in all your work and in everything you put your hand to.

Trinity UMC has been such a blessing to us, especially when our oldest son, Craig, died in 2004. He was only 29 years old. We don’t know how we would have managed the following months grieving over his loss. The fellowship that we experienced at Trinity was so loving and caring during some dark days dealing with his death. Members of our Sunday School class, Ordinary People, stepped up and handled all matters at a reception at our home after the burial. Milt Burton called Kirk and insisted they have lunch that week prior to the funeral services. Kirk told Milt that he appreciated the call but we were overwhelmed with planning his funeral service and burial. Milt insisted and knew what Kirk was facing when he returned to work after our loss. Milt and Barbara had been through a tragic loss when Alyssia died on 9/11 in the World Trade Center attack. Kirk has always been appreciative of Milt’s wisdom and caring manner.

As a final thought, when our hearts were touched to begin tithing, we asked whether we should tithe our gross or net income? Convenencio replied “Do you want to be blessed gross or net?” We have always loved his response, and Kirk even commented, “Gross makes it an easy amount to calculate the tithe!!!”
