Pastor's Corner

By now you've probably heard the term Lent around Trinity. Lent is a time of preparation for Easter through spiritual disciplines such as prayer, fasting, devotion, and service. The 40 days of Lent (plus Sundays) come before Easter, starting on Ash Wednesday. The 40 days are reminiscent of the 40 days of rain during the flood, the 40 years of wandering in the wilderness by God's people during the Exodus and Jesus'40 days in the wilderness.

As a moveable feast, the **date of Easter** is determined in each year through a calculation known as *computus* (Latin for 'computation'). Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday after the Paschal full moon, which is the first full moon on or after 21 March (a fixed approximation of the March equinox).

One of the disciplines I'd like to commend to you during this time is stewardship. I know historically this has been about money. But it is so much more. Stewardship is a spiritual discipline that allows us to recognize God's work in our lives and return a portion of that to God's work on the world, as manifested in the church - this church specifically.

I hope you'll join me in the many disciplines of Lent, including Stewardship, as we head toward our joyous Easter celebration together.

Trinity is a great place to explore our faith together. Invite others to explore with us. Now is the time, because we are better together.

Lenten Easter Mission Offering

For many years, the Trinity congregation has supported the Lenten Easter Mission Offering (LEMO). Congregational donations to LEMO are used to help nonprofits in the Richmond area, the Commonwealth of Virginia, the United States, and the world.

In 2023, fourteen organizations applied for grants. Those grants totaled \$27,800 in funding requests. From the congregation, we received \$14,788.21 to distribute to the thirteen nonprofits who were awarded a grant based upon their application.

During this Lenten season, we hope you will prayerfully consider donating to LEMO. Your financial support will help to make a significant difference in a person's life.


This is what we are learning about in March:

Trustees Update

Update on Our Building Renovation Project

We have executed a contract with Century Construction for a \$2 million renovation of the Children's Education Wing/Trinity Preschool. The renovation also includes the second floor from the Balcony to the Preschool wing, and the following areas on the main floor directly below: the Conference Room, Modern Worship Leader's Office, and the Nursery.

Improvements will impact close to thirty classrooms and all hallways with an emphasis on the following: a new HVAC system for this wing, upgrades to all restrooms used by the Preschool, the construction of a new ADA restroom on the basement level, new lighting, floor surfaces, painting, windows, and enhancements to fire and security systems.

The details for proposals related to upgrades for our fire, security, and WIFI are under review. We hope to be signing these contracts soon. The staff has toured the space to address any final questions and identify the furniture and fix-tures to be stored, recycled, or discarded.

Our contractor has committed to completing the project by the middle of August, but only if we turn the parts of the building being renovated over to them on the Tuesday after Memorial Day. Prior to this start date, storage units and a dumpster will be positioned in the parking lot closest to the Preschool. This will allow us to begin packing, moving, and filling the storage units.

In working with the Trinity staff and Century Construction, the Trustees have identified multiple pre-construction chores that will need congregational support. Volunteers will be needed to remove a variety of wall mounted items, obsolete storage cabinets, and outdated fixtures. Volunteers will be needed for packing boxes and moving items to storage units. This work will take place during April and May, and volunteers will need to be prepared to work around any activities taking place in the building. As soon as we firm up the schedule and tasks we will be asking for volunteers.

We are excited about this project, and yet we know patience, flexibility, and teamwork are going to be needed from start to finish.

Winter Weather Decisions

Decisions for closing our building related to winter weather are tricky. Basically, we follow the closing announcements from Henrico County Public Schools. For example, if

schools close early or are on a delayed opening, Trinity's opening and closing times are adjusted. If Henrico schools are closed, Trinity will be closed, and this would include all day and evening events. Our ability to re-open the building after a winter weather event depends upon how quickly we can clear our sidewalks and parking lots. If we can safely get people on to our grounds and into our building, then Trinity might return to normal operations quicker than the school system.
